

# Open Houses continue


Scheduled Open Houses, designed to provide area residents with an opportunity to review proposed route changes in North Delta and Newton, continue June 7th, 8th and 14th.

# The Buzzer: Three score years and ten

The Buzzer, brainchild of George Kidd, general manager of B.C. Electric, was born on June 2, 1916 to help streetcars in their competition with 'Jitney' operators — private citizens with cars who patrolled streetcar routes and offered rides for five cents.

The Buzzer would promote the use of streetcars by keeping people informed about service and fostering rider loyalty.

Jitney service was abolished in July, 1918, but the Buzzer continued and has been read by generations of Greater Vancouver transit riders.

The first issue was headed "Wanted — A Name" and offered to pay \$15 for the best suggestion, \$10 for the second best and \$5 for the third best. Big money in the days when a streetcar ride was five cents.

We don't have an original report of the winning entries, but the 25th Anniversary issue, June 6, 1941, says that eleven people submitted the winning name. They were: W.J. Buckingham, Charles J. Cameron, Frank P. Downes, A.J. Harrison, Miss Kathleen M. Hartley, Mrs. G.W. Isaacs, E.J. Judd, Joseph A. Macfarlane, Mrs. J.J. Miller, Mrs. F.W. Parkin and Miss Marguerite Philip. The writer goes on to wonder how many were still in Vancouver.

In this centennial year, it would be even more interesting to know something about these people and if any of them or their families are still in Vancouver.
