### Barkerville Tour Recaptures Atmosphere of Gold Rush Days

Two of Pacific Stage Lines' most popular tours will be repeated during early August; one to historic Barkerville; the other to Vancouver Island, including a visit to the rugged west coast.

The Barkerville tour begins at 8 a.m., Saturday, August 4, from Vancouver Bus Depot, Dunsmuir and Cambie. You'll return to Vancouver at 8.30 p.m., Monday, August 6. You'll travel on a comfortable highway coach over the smooth, Fraser Canyon Highway, once a twisting trail dotted by miners struggling north for gold. You'll pass Yale, Spences Bridge, Cache Creek, 100 Mile House, Williams Lake to Quesnel where you'll stay for two nights.

At 8.30 Sunday morning, you'll leave for Barkerville which has been rebuilt to capture the gold rush atmosphere of a century ago. You can become part of the mood quickly by panning your own gold, by visiting the old


theatre with its twice-daily shows based on history, by riding the stage coach which runs 10 times daily over the Cariboo Trail from Barkerville to nearby Richfield.

At 4 p.m., your modern bus will take you away from the 1862 gold rush atmosphere and back to Quesnel. At 8 a.m. Monday morning, you'll leave for home. Rates for this exciting trip, including transportation and hotel accomodations, range from \$39.25 to \$42.75—depending on sleeping accomodations required.

The Vancouver Island tour leaves the bus depot at 7.45 a.m., Saturday, August 11, arrives back at Vancouver about 8.30 p.m., Monday.

Cost of the tour, including transportation, hotel accomodations, Victoria sightseeing and lunch at Ucluelet, ranges from \$31.50 to \$35.65.
